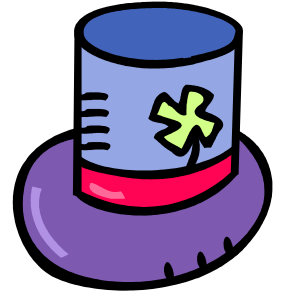


## **Using the Six Hats to Respond to Literature**



**Blue Hat** controls which hat goes on and off. Blue Hat tells us when to switch hats and indicates what type of thinking is needed

### **White Hat: Information and facts about the book**

- Title
- Author and Illustrator
- Awards that the book may have won (CBC Picture Book, Bilby Award)
- Plot- what happened, story map, Top Level Structure,
- Characters- names, what they look like
- Setting

### **Red Hat: Discussing feelings, likes and dislikes**

- How did the book make you feel?
- How did you feel when the character did...?
- How did the ending make you feel?
- Did you like the story, illustrations, characters etc?

### **Yellow Hat: Benefits, good points and advantages**

- What was the advantage of solving the problem that way?
- What are the advantages of...?
- What are all the good points about...the character, the setting, the ending etc?

### **Black Hat: Disadvantages, dangers and problems**

- What are the dangers involved in visiting ... (the setting of the book)?
- What are the disadvantages in trying to solve problems that way?
- When \_\_\_\_ did \_\_\_\_\_, what problems did they encounter?

### **Green Hat: New ideas, creating, adapting, innovating**

- Lets write a new ending
- Write an acrostic about the main character
- Draw new illustrations for the story
- Think of a different way to solve the problem
- Write an innovation on the story
